Prize winning answer to the question posed by a young guest "how do you join Rotary?" was from **Lynne** who replied "join an event being held for a Rotary cause" Answers such as "enter a room full of grey-haired people sitting at tables in their usual seats" did not score well.

Watching the TV news about the humanitarian crisis in Gaza every night, many of us ask "but what can WE do." Well it turns out that as Rotarians we are already well and truly involved in providing some help there.

As **David H** explained, Rotary and Shelterbox have formed partnerships, delivered aid, and supported people in Gaza

when they need it most. They have partnered with agencies like Medical Aid for Palestinians (MAP).To mitigate against some of the extreme risks involved



in sending aid into an active conflict zone they are using multiple aid routes. For example, tents sent from around the world have been delivered through Egypt and Jordan. About Shelterbox:

In 2000, a Rotary Club in Cornwall adopted ShelterBox as its millennium project. Little did they know that it would become the largest club project in the world, responding to disasters and conflict across the globe and providing emergency shelter to over 1.5 million people. ShelterBox has grown from one club's adopted project to Rotary International's only Project Partner in disaster

When **Lynne** visited the new Manukura School at the invitation of Milson Rotary she came away disappointed that not all the Māori welcomes protocols were used. She explained that visitors would be first called (karanga) and after entering and sitting, speeches of welcome given and replied to. These are followed by a waiata, the visitors present koha (gifts), a karakia (blessing) sung and hosts and visitors hongi (sharing of breath – peace) followed by kai (food) being served.
